Students

- Be aware of what you are sharing (e.g. pictures of yourself, your location/school etc)
- Always set your 'Privacy Settings' to the highest possible (usually 'Friends only')
- Only post things you would be happy with your family seeing
- Turn off Location-based services
- Only be 'friends' with people who you have actually met.

Parents

- Visit www.thinkuknow.co.uk with your child to understand what support there is available
- Show an interest and learn about what your child does online
- Stay in control where possible keep phone chargers downstairs, turn your Wifi off at night.
- Be there for your child to turn to
